

AMBASSADOR BOWLERS ARE RUNNERS-UP IN BOTH DIVISIONS

For the first time an Ambassador Centre, Ambassador Lanes, Edgware, was the venue for a national bowling tournament - the Tenpin Bowling Proprietors Association 4th Annual National Invitation Singles Championships. Appropriately enough, Ambassador bowlers were in among the honours, being the runners-up in both Ladies and Men's Divisions.

The 60 bowlers invited to the Championships were certainly among the top average bowlers at present in this country, and for this year's tournament, a new format had been devised. In the qualifying rounds, competitors were placed in sections of six and played a round robin on the Petersen Points scoring system. The two leaders in each section then qualified for the Grand Final.

Leading the qualifiers from the Ladies Section was Brenda Clapper, who bowled 1021 pins over the five games for an average of 204. The Men's leader was Tony King, with 1035 for an average of 207. JOHN ROURKE, the youngest competitor taking part, had ten strikes in a row in his fourth game for a 269 total, which was the highest game of the day. Brenda Clapper achieved the Ladies high with a 244 game. During the qualifying round of the Ladies Section, the main surprise was the complete eclipse of the strong Liverpool contingent of six, including four of the SILHOUETTES team.

The Grand Final, also a round robin, was played over 9 games, the final winner being the bowler with the highest number of points over the 14 games. Competition in the Finals was extremely keen in far from comfortable conditions, due to the heat of the day. Unfortunately, two bowlers in the Men's Division had to retire with split thumbs during the final. First, Bill White from Leeds, who had had his bowling bag, ball and shoes stolen from his car on the evening prior to the tournament, used house equipment to take him

into the Final, but the strain of using a borrowed ball was just too much and he retired after just two games of the Final. The number of games was also too much for JOHN ROURKE, retiring after 6 games of the final.

Brenda Clapper, a housewife with a young daughter, representing Top Rank Southampton and the winner of the £300 First Prize in the Daily Mirror Ladies, Scratch Singles Championships, ran out a comfortable winner for the Ladies, scoring 63.24 points for an average of 187.

Runner up was VIOLET BIRD, also a housewife, from AMBASSADOR LANES, BASILDON, who, throughout the day had bowled steadily and carefully to total 61.44 points, for an average of 180 over the 14 games.

The Men's Division proved to be a very tight struggle and with two games left, any one of the eight remaining finalists still had a chance of winning. Joe Kilian, entering from Stamford Hill, but in fact one of the Brunswick Jets, came out eventual champion, scoring 63.30 points, knocking down 2,665 pins, just 53 more than Brenda Clapper. HARLOW bowler, 17-year-old DAVID POND, entering from A.B.C. Dagenham, was placed second with the highest pinfall of the tournament, 2720 for an average of 194 after the 14 gruelling games. Unluckily David could not win enough of his matches to give him the necessary points to beat Joe Kilian, finishing with just 62.40.

A newcomer to big time bowling, MICK GAITT, entering from AMBASSADOR LANES, EDGWARE, bowling in rental shoes and using a house ball, led the Men's Section comfortably up to the end of the 10th game, but unfortunately the pace proved a little too much and his scores dropped badly to pull him down into 5th place over the final four games.

To a fanfare of trumpets of the Royal Marines Herald Trumpeters from the Deal School of Music, the magnificent T.B.P.A. trophies were presented to the winners and runners-up, by the Chairman of the T.B.P.A., Mr. L.E. Carpenter.

ON THE OTHER SIDE

\$100,000 Firestone Tournament of Champions. With more than 9,000 fans jammed into Riviera Lanes, Akron, Ohio, plus millions of televiewers, this great tournament reached its climax with Dick Weber playing Wayne Zahn. All eyes were on Weber who was a very hot favourite to take the title but he bowled his one bad game of the tournament, a 170, and meanwhile Wayne Zahn bowled a 203 to win his first ever professional tournament, and a cheque for \$25,000.

The latest novelty tournament which has been held at St. Louis Western Bowl is a Lo-Co mixed doubles tournament. The first game is regular bowling with a prize for every strike on the red headpin.

Throughout the event are a variety of awards for both men and women. In the case of a 300 game, the bowler receives a life size autographed picture of the Manager in shorts. Or, if he prefers, he may select another prize of equal value.

The second game is somewhat different. In the first frame, everybody bowls from a chair - first ball right handed, second ball left handed.

After that come frames in which the bowler turns his back to the pins, couples walk to the line with their arms round each others waist, the bowler kicks the ball down the lane, or bowls blindfolded or uses both hands or a one step approach.

Nobody starts the third game until everybody has stumbled through game No.2 because the lights are turned out, except those on the pin deck. Then the couples bowl scotch doubles style for a straight third game.

"Bill Brown bowls perfect 600 game", It could be possible - Carom Bowling is a new innovation of the Brunswick Corporation. Installations for this new game are under way now in six towns in the U.S.A.

The game has been under test for a year in Wisconsin, and many of the bowling industry's leaders have seen Carom in action.

Carom Bowl is played on regulation lanes, with one glaring exception: the gutters are raised to expose rubberized edges not unlike the cushions on billiard tables. Contestants simply roll the ball against either or both cushions and hit regulation tenpins at the end of the lane.

Beginner bowlers love Carom Bowl because it is impossible to throw a gutter ball. But oldtimers grouse over the fact that a good conventional shot is penalized. To earn bonus points in Carom Bowl, a player must hit at least one cushion.

In Carom Bowl the player earns a five point bonus for hitting one cushion and a 10 point bonus for using two cushions when making a strike or spare.

TELEVISION OF BOWLING

The television cameras came to Edgware once again on Saturday 4th June to record tenpin bowling, this time for the London area programme "A Look on Sunday" shown on Sunday 5th June.

Bowlers invited to take part were Jim Brewer, Paul Lane, Claire Williams and Ena Grant, the girls were invited after their very fine performances in the recent National Championships.

Jim and Paul led off with a singles match which proved extremely exciting, Paul taking a 42 pin lead after two games and Jim finally coming back with 208 to win by 2 pins, 592 to 590.

For the first time on television, Paul teamed with Ena and Jim with Claire to play a one game scotch doubles match and high scoring and good bowling resulted with Paul and Ena winning by 214 to 192.

Shaw Taylor acted once again as commentator and was in top form throughout seeming to particularly enjoy the novelty and speed of the scotch doubles match.




As stated in last month's edition of the Ambassador Newsletter, we now have pleasure in giving you illustrations and full details of the Bowling Accessory Sale.






