
The Doubles Event was won by Colin Tucker and Don Wood from Basildon with a 1111 three game series.

The finals of the 5th Ambassador Bowler of the Year Tournament were held at Ambassador Lanes, Stevenage on the 17th September and, against competition from all Ambassador centres, this year's champions emerged.

Don Buckley, from Basildon, was the winner in the Mens Singles event; Mary Buckley, again from Basildon, became the Ladies Singles champion; and the Ambassadors, Don Wood and Colin Tucker, also from Basildon, took the Doubles title. This was a really wonderful achievement on the part of these Basildon bowlers and our congratulations go out to them for their truly fine performance.

In the Junior Singles event Steven Roberts, from Stevenage, was unable to match the form of Steve Harris, from Ipswich, who came out a worthy winner in this event.

In the Trios section a very close finish resulted in the Hovertravel team, from Wolverhampton, winning by 4 pins over the Portsmouth team. The anchorman of the Wolverhampton team had to strike in his tenth frame of the final game to ensure victory and this he did without showing any nerves whatsoever. A word of commiseration for Portsmouth, who became runners-up for the second year in succession. To them we say 'Better luck next time'.

Record Holders Club

This month saw five new members welcomed to the Record Holders Club, three of the members for performances in the Coca-Cola King Keglers League (Tenpin Pictorial), namely Ann Garrett whose 254 ladies game becomes a house record, Phil Russell whose 679 series beat the existing record, and Ron Deacon's latest of 690. Young Steve Harris, from Ipswich, was elected to become a member on his wonderful performance in becoming Ambassador Junior Bowler of the Year, and also Laurie Ramsey from the Ambassadors team at Basildon who was the only player of the team not previously a member. His team won the 1967 Newtown Festival of Sport Tournament.

ON THE OTHER SIDE

\$32,000 to Petersen Champ

Ed Takacs of Cleveland is \$32,000 richer, thanks to his victory in the 57th Petersen Classis. Takacs shot an eight game series of 1678 to outscore 17,535 other contestants in bowling's biggest singles event. Jerry Farrow of Philadelphia ran second with 1673 to win \$17,000 and Ray Ivis of Chicago picked up \$8,000 for his third place total of 1660. The tournament, which is conducted at Archer-35th Recreation in Chicago, paid out a total of \$491,008 in prizes.

Hoinke Crown to Hopper

Herschel Hopper of Nashville, Tennessee, is \$22,000 wealthier because of his win in the singles handicap division of the 25th annual Hoinke Classic in Cincinnati. Hopper shot a five game total of 1218, including 105 pins handicap, to easily outdistance Billy Bruce of Gainsville, Ga., who took the \$11,000 runner—up cheque with a gross total of 1167. Ben Visan of Bedford, O., won the \$3,500 scratch title with an 1136 total.

Five Kings of Philadelphia, Pa., won \$9,000 for a 3286 gross total in the team handicap section. The \$1000 actual top prize went to Schoenlings All-Stars of Cincinnati who had 3148.

The 20 weekend tournament paid off a total of \$235,000 in prizes.

Shoots 812 in AJBC League

James A. Nelson, 15, bowling in the Ft. Irwin, Calif. AJBC league, set an all-time Junior Congress series record when he put together games of 266, 247 and 299 for an 812, the first time an AJBC member has rolled over 800. Nelson started bowling 18 months ago. Both his father and mother are active in Ft. Irwin adult league competition and introduced their son to the game. He has developed into a 199 average star and earlier this season had sets of 700 and 739.

IPSWICH

The Chief Constable of the Suffolk Police, Mr. Peter Matthews paid tribute to the work which had been done when he visited the Centre on the final night of the Ambassador Road Safety Week.

For seven days the Suffolk Police has staged their own Road Safety Exhibition in the Centre, while on the lanes, and in the car park, doubles partnerships had taken part in a bowling/car manoeuvrebility competition. In addition there was a special class of bowling competition for the J.Y.B.C. section.

The idea, originally by centre manager, Mr. Adams, had received the wholehearted support of the Police, The Institute of Advanced Motorists and the Automobile Association. In addition, more than twenty local firms donated prizes enabling the winners to receive something right down to the tenth place. Although not associated directly with Road Safety Week, the centre was also in the public's eye throughout the week as Europe's first 'Motique' - a boutique inside a converted caravan - gave its official launching at Ambassador Lanes, and during the week was featured on Anglia Television.

Prize donators are too numerous to mention but amongst their gifts were £10 worth of tyres from the Regional Tyre Service which went as the first prize to bowling centre personalities Ray Smith and Brian Burrell. The Best Drivers award went to Inspector Shields of the Suffolk Police but regarding himself as a professional, he declined to accept his prize which went instead to his nearest rival, bowling mechanic, Paul Webster. No prizes for Club Bar Stewardess, Mrs. Mary Wright - she forgot to stop on the course and sent officials diving to rescue their timing equipment as Mary's car went ploughing through an obstacle.

This week could not have been such a success without the valuable assistance of Mr. John Bird and Mr. Dave Rodgers, representing the Institute of Advanced Motorists who were always on hand to carry out the marshalling on the test course.

The Chief Constable presented the prizes and received, from Mr. Adams, a cheque for £25 to be donated to the Suffolk Police Benevolent Fund. Mr. Matthews said that some of the money would probably go to a Suffolk policeman who, while attending the scene of a road accident was himself knocked



When in trouble - send for Russell. This has been a fond cry at the centre in the past and is likely to be in the future. That is why this month we have chosen Ken Russell as our personality.

Chief Instructor, J.Y.B.C. organiser, founder of Ipswich's inter-schools championship when it comes to helping others on the lanes, Ken's assistance in the centre is unprecedented.

He often claims that instructors do not make good bowlers - they are too busy analysing others faults to devote enough attention to their own bowling.

This may be perfectly true, but on the credit side his conscientious instructional periods for open bowlers - during the Sunday evening peak hours - have helped a lot of "fun" players get more enjoyment out of the game.

Ipswich can be proud of its J.Y.B.C. record and here Ken has played a major role. From a rather odd assortment that first passed through the doors when the J.Y.B.C. was formed, he has moulded them into a club which now seems to respect centre property, shows sportsmanship and responsibility, and a flair for providing Ipswich's league bowlers of tomorrow.

Perhaps the best tribute to Ken Russell's efforts has been the entry of a J.Y.B.C. team into an adult league. Named the J.Y.B.C. Allstars, they have started off the season with a bang.

Ken bowls in the same league though. Could be that he will have mixed feelings if he finds himself on the end of a beating from his young protegees.

The long awaited inter-county challenge match between Suffolk and Cambridgeshire took place at Ipswich on September 3rd.

Suffolk men won their match by 16 points to 8, while the ladies found the going tougher and had to be content with a 12-12 draw. A feature of the match was the fine doubles bowling by Dick Smith (607) and Tony Vaughan (611) which included an opening team game of 649. Even then, it was only good enough by ten pins to take the game. Suffolk men were represented by Colin Prime, Doug Vaughan and Les Greenacre (trios); Dick Smith and Tony Vaughan (doubles); Ray Smith (singles). The ladies team was Irene Mackie, Pat Lucas

and Sal Raudy (trios); Sandra Heal and Sheila Stringer (doubles); Joan Phillips (singles).

Ambassador kindly presented a set of Suffolk county badges to commemorate the occasion and these were presented to the local teams by John Newman, editor of the "Tenpin Pictorial".

At an informal meeting afterwards it was decided to go ahead with an inter-county tournament at Ipswich shortly. Applications are invited from county teams and there will be a separate competition for men and ladies. The playing format will be slightly different. Teams will still consist of 6 players, but this time all will play trios, doubles and singles, making a total of 3 series per bowler in all. Points will be awarded at the rate of 1 for every 50 pins scored, with a bonus for 200 games.

It is hoped that at least every county within the Ambassador network will make a serious attempt to send along teams. This will be the forerunner of what is hoped to be a national inter-county championship next year, and a meeting on that day will be called to formulate a county playing association.

It has just been confirmed that Churchmans, the Ipswich cigar manufacturers have agreed to promote the proposed inter-county tenpin bowling championships in Ipswich.

The event was originally scheduled for November 19th but in view of the planning involved it has now been decided to put back the tournament to a date still to be fixed.

More details will be announced in the near future.

At Ipswich the Churchmans League, and the 'Friendly' as it was known previously, has now been rolling almost as long as this centre has been open.

Many of the original 'Friendly' League bowlers are still going strong, although naturally the present League has, of necessity, had to broaden it's ranks to progress in size and stature. Generally speaking, the great majority of the 'Old brigade' have through the years improved their averages, consistent with the experience gained, but there are still quite a number of regular

bowlers who are hard pressed to maintain even a moderate 150 average at times.

It is very strange therefore to comprehend why bowlers to not take advantage of the facilities at their command to improve their bowling averages. In the whole country, there are roughly 25 to 30 A.M.F. fully qualified advanced instructors. The Ipswich centre is fortunately placed in having two of these instructors at the centre, available to give instruction to the lower average (and even the better average bowlers to assist them in bettering their averages.

Presumably, if it were circularised in the centre, that an A.M.F. Instructor were to visit the centre from a more distant part of the country to hold a bowling clinic, there would no doubt be quite a response from the bowlers generally. It would appear on the face of it, however, that familiarity does breed contempt, and we are prone to assume that the bowler we know, can teach us little that we do not already know. This however, is not the case. It should be common knowledge that a good instructor does not have to be in the professional 200 average class of bowler before he can impart his knowledge to other bowlers.

The A.M.F. Advanced Instructor course was designed with the prime object to assist all bowlers to achieve better pinfall and better averages generally. Why not therefore take advantage of the facility provided to improve your average. In Ipswich, either Ken Russell or myself will be only too pleased to assist you, and we would take a great pride in seeing your bowling improve in stature.
