This has been a good thing as far as finding bowlers of less prowess and being able to give them the chance in Representative Bowling. However, it does open up a space for criticism of

those who have come forward.

We spoke to two top team managers on this issue. The first said that all his players would be available for County Selection, even if it meant withdrawing from a big money Tournament to make this possible. His point of view was that certain prestige Tournaments were part of bowling, and enhanced the building of his team and its name, and gave his players the opportunity to become recognised as individual sportsmen of International Calibre.

The other one intimated of wanting to know only of putting his players in a something that would build money for the 'kitty' and to this end no 'Trophy' Tournament should stand in the way. We wonder if all the players who happen to be attached to a team holding this type of policy are aware of these sentiments and if so agree with

A delegate spoke from the floor of the A.G.M. last month asking if County Representation should not be the fore-runner of International Selection as in most other sports. Bowlers may well soon decree that this situation should not be too long coming.

As this will be the last edition of 'Pinformation' in the Fiscal year may we take the opportunity to thank all members who have supported the L.A.B.A. this year, and increased our membership by $17\frac{1}{2}$ per cent over last year. May we look forward to many more Sanctioned Leagues in the 1969/70 Season.

NEWS FROM THE STATES

HUNTSVILLE, Ala: The Professional Bowlers Association's (PBA's) summer tour has another new winner.

Husky JOE DIGNAM, a 21 year old 190 pounder who joined the tour this summer, held off a closing rush by TIM HARAHAN, to win the \$32,000 Huntsville Open at Pin Palace Lanes.

DIGNAM, who cashed in two of his previous tournament tries this summer, held only a 14 pin lead over HARAHAN going into the position round game; but he administered the knockout drops to HARAHAN 206 - 171.

The world's best bowlers were making their first tournament stop over in Huntsville, and the fine crowds there were treated to some great competition. DIGNAM found Pin Palace to his liking right from the start, and when he rolled a 290 score on his last qualifying game, he took over the lead with a count of 5286, an average of 220. He lost the lead briefly to HARAHAN at the start of match game play, and then regained it in the third game and held it all the way. JIM GODMAN, also challenged early for the lead but then went into a nosedive, losing 14 of his 16 match play games, finishing 16th. DIGNAM won \$3,000 for the championship effort and upped his summer earnings to \$3,765.

PORTLAND, Ore: In what had to be one of the Professional Bowlers Association's (PBA's) all-time cliff-hangers, young ALLIE CLARKE of Akron, Ohio won the \$32,000 Portland Open at Valley Lanes. CLARKE defeated 20 year old LARRY LICHSTEIN, 224 to 189, in the position round championship game to wipe out an 11 pin deficit and record the first PBA tournament victory of his career. At the same time on an adjoining pair of lanes, MIKE McGRATH was eking out a thrilling 227 to 225 win over Butch Gearhart, and when the cheers from the packed crowd subsided, it was CLARKE, McGRATH, GEARHART and LICHSTEIN in that order. It was one of the PBA's most closely contested tourneys ever. In the ninth frame of the championship game all four leaders still had a chance to win the title. LICHSTEIN had taken over the tourney lead in the 13th game after McGRATH and GEARHART had wrestled back and forth for it most of the day. CLARKE had not moved into contention until there were only two games remaining. BILL JOHNSON of New Orleans gave the fans another thrill when he picked up a 300 game

THE INCREDIBLE ASTRA BOWL

Imagine twelve bowling lanes complete with telescores and telefouls; a well stocked bar with four different types of beer on draught and your favourite wines in stock; a self-service cafeteria capable of producing anything from a snack to a three-course meal; a concourse and cafe area overlooking the bowling which will seat up to 100 and a Pro-shop stocking all the bowling equipment anyone could wish for; all this, next door to a well-appointed cinema, and you have some idea of the unique set-up that the R.A.F. Cinema Corporation has installed at R.A.F. Brize Norton. As may be expected, such a facility did not spring into being overnight. When the United States Air Force vacated Brize Norton in 1964 they left behind a cinema in a rather austere form and twelve tenpin bowling lanes but with no pin-setting machinery and a very few other facilities: both being accomodated in a corrugated iron hanger. The first task of the R.A.F. Cinema Corporation was to rehabilitate the cinema and this was done by building a new foyer, new projection room, replacing the majority of the seats and re-decorating the cinema throughout. Air Vice Marshall G.C. Stowell, the Managing Director of the R.A.F. Cinema Corporation, had expressed an interest in the tenpin Bowling Centre but no action was taken until Wing Commander V.J.Corne was posted into Brize Norton in May, 1967 as OC Supply Squadron. Apart from being a moderate but keen bowler himself, he had been Officer i/c Bowling at R.A.F. Changi during his tour in F.S.A.F. and had heard that Brize Norton possessed some bowling lanes. Although no money was available for the introduction of tenpin bowling with P.S.I. support, he nevertheless looked into the possibility of it being done in some other form and it was at this point that contact was made with Air Marshal Stowell. After a number of meetings and discussions the R.A.F. Cinema Corporation undertook to rehabilitate and re-decorate the bowling centre, install six pin-setting machines and employ a professional Manager to run both the bowling and the cinema. Group Captain R.C.Wilson, the then Station Commander, bowled the opening ball to inaugurate tenpin bowling at the Astra Bowl on 15th January, 1968. Attendance was so encouraging that two more lanes were installed with pin-setting machines during July 1968 and in November of the same year it was decided to install machines in the remaining four lanes ready for the first full winter season.

In June 1968, Miss Clare Williams, the well-known Brunswick professional bowling instructor spent five days at the Astra Bowl and helped many bowlers to improve their game, as well as training five instructors, including Mrs. Betty Corner, the wife of the Officer i/c so that instruction could be available to all beginners and other bowlers. This was followed by a visit from Paul Lane, the well known A.M.F. instructor, in December.

From the beginning emphasis was placed on two things - value for money; the cost of bowling at the Astra is very reasonable, the merits of this policy being proved by the volume of business done; and secondly, the encouragement of bowling by the widest possible range of the station population. Special emphasis is placed on encouraging bowling as a family sport and, to this end, all new arrivals who move into one of the married quarters at Brize Norton finds tucked into his inventory a pamphlet about the Astra Bowl and a complimentary ticket entitling his family to a free bowling session. At the same time, the keen bowling enthusiasts are catered for by a wide variety of league competitions and teams are encouraged to enter for external competitions. Plans for the future include further improvements to the catering facitities and concourse: It is hoped that a ball-drilling machine will be installed so that enthusiasts may not only buy their ball at the Astra Bowl but have it drilled to fit their own individual measurements. The running of more competitions than ever before is also planned.

The Bowl is managed on behalf of the R.A.F. Cinema Corporation (now the Services Kinema Corporation) by Mr. Bernard (Bernie the Bolt Caine,) who has brought to the Astra Bowl and Cinema a wide experience of the entertainment industry. He is assisted by two assistant managers and

the instructors and has a full civilian cinema and bowling staff to support him.

B.T.B.A. A.G.M.

The Annual General Meeting of the BTBA was held at the Cora Hotel, London, W.C.1. on Sunday 20th July, 1969, and although only some fifty people were in attendance it was no less constructive and informative.

Mr. Eric Terry in the Chair spoke in his report of a year of quiet consolidation, allowing the new constitution to unfold its democratic policy. He continued to observe that some County Associations have been slow in providing members for the Council and therefore the Council had not been in a position to form all of the sub-committees it

would have liked.

He enlightened the meeting to the fact that the Player Association had recently been requested to handle the Sanctioning of lanes in 25 of the 94 Commercial Centres in this country, and as we were already providing sanction for 15 of the 17 Forces Centres, this now meant that the BIBA are now supplying lane certification to 40 per cent of the country's bowling centres, if one discounts the 10 centres that have no lane certification at all. After praising the bowlers in the European Championships he expressed delight in the very high standard of bowling at present achieved in this country.

Mr. Harold King then presented the meeting with

Mr. Harold King then presented the meeting with the balance sheet and his Treasurer's report, and commented that this year had beer one of considerable economy and had eliminated the red balance of last year. This has been mainly due to the General Secretary receiving no money other than expenses, for another year. Mr. Tinling then reported to the meeting on the activities of the Selection Committee during the year and mentioned the inovation of a short List of England Men and Women Bowlers and also the introduction this year of women to the Invitational Masters Event at the Nationals. He said that he would like to prepare a vote of thanks to all the bowlers who represented Gt. Britain in the European Championships and in particular the non playing Managers who contributed so much to the National success we had enjoyed.

In answer to a question from the floor that National Selection should not be considered for any bowler who had not qualified through their own County Championships, Mr. Tinling replied that he thought the time was near when this aspect would be considered, in keeping with

most other forms of sport.

Mr. Tinling still held the floor when we was called upon to report on Press and Publicity, he stated that we had particularly good relationships now with the press but we needed to achieve much larger Press coverage in the future.

A report on current affairs of the F.I.Q. was given by the General Secretary who attended the meetings in Copenhagen and Budapest in his capacity as President of the F.I.Q. A position which he now no longer holds but he will still be looking after our affairs at F.I.Q. having been elected to the World Committee Organisation. A separate report should be ready in time to be published in this edition of Pinformation.

The Meeting agreed that as at this time a President would not be elected, but Mr. Terry was re-elected as Chairman and Mr. Len Horton as Vice-Chairman. Formal approval was given to a precidium set up by the National Council consisting of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman Mr. Stan Plant, Brian Langford and Ron Miles in order for them to get together at short notice when urgent decisions were needed. After a bid for the National Championships by the London Area and a vote of thanks to the Chairman the shortest Annual General Meeting in the history of the Player Association to date came to a close.

BEXLEYHEATH. WILL CLARK, Dagenham, who last month was robbed of a perfect '300' game by a single six pin, must be one of the favourites in this round which will be contested on Sunday August, 17th. Amongst the 21 rivals for the ten places in the finals are the 1967 World Doubles Champion, JES MORLEY, of Stanford-le-hope, Essex, and Swede TOM RATCHUNAS, who lives in North London.

BRISTOL. MRS. DOREEN HAWES, who moved to Bristol from London some two years ago, has an automatic qualification for the finals as she is the only lady competitor to contest the Bristol round. There are fifteen men contesting the seven places in their division and among the favourites must be REG CLIST and JOSEPH FLORAMO, who both reached the finals at Wembley last year.

COVENTRY. ALBERT KIRKHAM, of Hanley, the first Englishman to bowl a perfect '300' game is among the twelve competitors in this round, but he could have a hard time qualifying for the Wembley finals against the seven local bowlers. In the Ladies division local bowler, SHEILA HEALES, competes against the experienced MRS. LILIAN BENNETT of Bletchley, and MRS. M.MOSELEY, Rotherham, for one of the two places allocated in the finals to the ladies competing at Coventry.

DARLINGTON. Sunderland's MEG COOMBES, who won two Gold Medals in the recent European Championships, begins her trek to Wembley in the Match Play Championships when she competes in the qualifying round at Darlington. MEG, who was beaten in the Grand Finals last year by local bowler, MARGARET LITTLE, is competing in her first national tournament since she won her medals. In the men's division 'home' bowlers KEN WOOD and A. TUCKER, who bowl in league each week at Darlington will be hard pressed to gain one of the six places in the finals against the very strong contingents from Sunderland, Middlesborough, Sheffield and Rotherham.

GLASGOW. MR. & MRS. DAVE BOWMAN, of Glenrothes are once again out to win their way through to the Wembley finals when they compete in the qualifying round at Hampden. They both reached the finals last year. Also hoping to make his second trip in two years is JOHN GUTHRIE, another of the Glenrothes bowlers.

LAKENHEATH. JOHN WELLS, Bury St. Edmunds will have his work cut out to qualify for the finals when he competes in the qualifying round at the U.S. base at Lakenheath against BOB WICKS, Cambridge, and G. LEWREY and R.HOLLINGTON, who are making the trip from Hoddesdon.

LEEDS. Former Match Play Champions, JIM and RHODA BREWER, who moved to Murfield from London earlier this year both take another shot at the titles when they compete in the qualifying round at Leeds. JIM won the Men's title in 1963 and his wife RHODA the Ladies event in 1964. Since JIM and RHODA started bowling in the Leeds area they have been up among the high scores and should have Little trouble in qualifying for the Wembley finals. Other prominent 'keglers' who should qualify at Leeds are internationals ALEX CAMPONI, RON DEACON and HEC MEADUS, while among the strong Sheffield contingent are father and son MARCEL and JOHN DEMERY two of last year's finalists.

POOLE. More than forty bowlers will contest the aplaces in the Wembley finals when they bowl in the Poole qualifying round on August 17th. Fresh from his trip to America is CHRIS BUCK, his broken leg repaired he was fit enough to travel to the States with the Harry Stiller Racers. In the ladies division there will be tremendous competition, with the three competitors from Portsmouth taking on five local ladies for the five Wembley places.

MANCHESTER. TERRY SULLIVAN, one of the British European Championship winning team, and fresh from his successful U.S. tour with the Harry Stiller Racers, will be one of the competitors in the Bel Vue qualifying round.
